CISCO'S DAN ALLEN LEADS CHOOSE DUPAGE PANEL DISCUSSION

Allen, who serves on the Choose
DuPage Board of Directors and was
recently appointed as Chairman of the
organization's Workforce Committee,
led a panel discussion at the College
of DuPage (COD) on March 24 on the
topic of "DuPage Metals and Machinery
Manufacturing: Talent Development and
Retention in DuPage County."

Two different panels discussed the challenges companies face in keeping DuPage County a world-class manufacturing center. Ways to support the existing talent, further development, and maintain retention of these types of manufacturing companies in the region, were mentioned by a variety of current leaders of the local manufacturing landscape.

CISCO's ongoing approach to curbing the construction labor shortage here in northeastern Illinois has been well-documented. Through CISCO's educational outreach, job shadow events, hands-on expos and the collaborative efforts of building trades and contractors; awareness of careers in the construction industry is helping the union apprenticeship programs thrive.

CISCO ON THE MOVE

CISCO PARTNER TECH CENTER OF DUPAGE HELPING TO BRIDGE STEM SKILLS GAP

In the past, when CISCO organizes a Hands-On Expo in DuPage County, often times, instructors from the Tech Center of DuPage (TCD) will be on hand, along with apprenticeship coordinators from many of the building trades, to demonstrate various construction-related techniques aimed at making students more aware of a career in the trades.

A recent article in the Daily Herald highlighted a few of the success stories that have come out of the TCD construction trades program. The following excerpts are courtesy of the Daily Herald.

As a high school junior, Jose Ortiz was struggling in math and language arts classes. A school counselor suggested to Ortiz to enroll in the TCD program as an elective. The program's emphasis is on carpentry, but also introduces students to electrical, plumbing, drywall and other build trades skills.

Today, Ortiz is a project manager for Cicero's Development Corporation in Plainfield (see photo below).



"Academic skills are huge in the construction industry," Ortiz said. "Everything from math, communication skills and problemsolving as a team are very important."

Vince Sticca, Director of the Apprenticeship Training Program for the Chicago Regional Council of Carpenters (CRCC), sums it up this way: "There is not one thing you do during the day in construction that does not involve math."

When asked why more high school graduates aren't applying to apprenticeship programs, Sticca cites the scarcity of high school programs like TCD's construction and welding programs, which prepare students for apprenticeships or related community college programs.

He also noted a lack of understanding among students and school counselors regarding the breadth of the industry's career pathways, its academic requirements, and the long-term economic benefits of an apprenticeship.

To address the shortage of skilled young workers in an industry with increasing retirements, CRCC teamed up with CISCO last fall to host "Educator Days." Seventy-five high school counselors and teachers spent two days experiencing handson construction projects, employing the technical math skills necessary to succeed in the building trades.

The Chicago Regional Council of Carpenters is proactive in addressing the issue of math proficiency.

Because an exam is required prior to acceptance into an apprenticeship program, the CRCC offers math refresher classes at no cost to applicants.

The instructional staff members at Technology Center of DuPage have proactively enhanced the academic skills inherent in each program's curriculum.

The past three years, two-thirds of seniors rated their TCD program "excellent or good" for strengthening their academic abilities in math, reading and science.

Jose Ortiz agrees: "The TCD program hands you all the tools you need to succeed."
