ANNUAL LUNCHEON ONE MONTH AWAY - APRIL 29, 2022



CISCO's Annual Luncheon is approaching fast and is scheduled for Friday, April 29th at Noon at Maggiano's Little Italy in Schaumburg.

The event will feature Keynote Speaker Javier Ramirez, Deputy Director of Field Operation for the Federal Mediation & Conciliation Service (FMCS), as well as the recognition ceremony of CISCO's 2022 Scholarship Award winners.

About The Speaker

Javier Ramirez began his FMCS career as a Commissioner in 2005. Currently, Javier is a member of the U.S. Senior Executive Staff serving as the FMCS Deputy Director of Field Operations, responsible for leading all U.S. Federal Mediators. President Biden nominated Mr. Ramirez to be the 20th Director of FMCS in June 2021.

Javier mediated disputes in all sectors of the economy (except air and rail) in professions such as the performing arts, public safety, education, hospitality, healthcare, manufacturing, and packing houses, to name just a few. Javier facilitated and/or mediated multi-party disputes in manufacturing, construction, and education. He was on the facilitation team for several regulatory negotiations, including the Department of Energy (DOE) negotiations that resulted in the largest energy-saving rule in DOE history.

Javier also trained and successfully facilitated parties in various collaborative bargaining models.

Prior to FMCS, Javier spent over 14 years in labor relations. His efforts have been featured in Rolling Stone, Chicago Tribune Magazine, Chicago Lawyer Magazine, cited in the New York Times Best Seller Fast Food Nation, and recognized by the College of Labor and Employment Lawyers.

CISCO ON THE MOVE

CPS SKILLED TRADES CAREER FAIR DRAWS OVER 3,000 STUDENTS



Another CISCO partnering effort - this time with Chicago Public Schools and the Chicago Cook Workforce Partnership - attracted more than 3,000 students to McCormick Place for a three day (March 22-24) Career Fair that featured 12 different building trades and dozens of contractors, pre-apprentice programs and other organizations.

Open to CPS students only, the goal of the Career Fair was to expose and connect students at risk of becoming disconnected from work and school after graduation, with the necessary information and tools to explore a career in the skilled trades.

"This event provided students with knowledge relating to the many different career paths within the union constitution industry," said Dan Allen, CISCO Executive Director. "The skilled trades allow you to 'earn while you learn,' graduate nearly or completely debt-free, receive excellent benefits, and secure a path to the middle class.

"Between the groundbreaking of mega construction projects within the Chicagoland area, and the industry's increased demand for skilled workers, CPS students have a unique opportunity to pursue fulfilling careers within the union construction

industry," Allen added.

The opening day featured speakers Mayor Lori Lightfoot, CPS CEO Pedro Martinez and Quintin Scott, a CPS student who is now interning with Pipefitters Local 597.

"Everywhere you look, you can see how the skilled trades and union labor has influenced and built our strong city," said Mayor Lightfoot.

"Skilled trades and their unions are vital to keeping our communities running," she added.

CPS currently offers 12 Career and Technical Education (CTE) construction trades programs across the city, and students showcased their work at the Skilled Trades Career Fair.

"The fair was a great opportunity for our students to learn how to apply core educational skills to a skilled trade," said Chicago Public Schools CEO Pedro Martinez.

Chicago Builds (another program that CISCO was involved in helping get off the ground) is a unique 2-year off-

campus program offering CPS juniors and seniors an opportunity to receive technical training in electricity and other skilled trades fields.
